With this funding, we will be able to train foster parent programs through our Circles of Safety training, along with rigorous evaluation. Raliance Grant

Stop It Now! is excited to share that we've received a one-year grant from Raliance - a collaborative initiative dedicated to ending sexual violence in one generation - to continue and help fund our organization's promising training series, Circles of Safety. Circles of Safety will be implemented and evaluated in participating specialized foster care programs in the northeast region and will help strengthen communities' and organizations' capacity to create safe environments. In total, Raliance is funding 27 projects across the country totaling \$1.2 million in the first year. Raliance is composed of three top sexual violence prevention organizations: the National Sexual Violence Resource Center (NSVRC), the California Coalition Against Sexual Assault (CALCASA)-PreventConnect and the National Alliance to End Sexual Violence (NAESV).

"A Safer Family. A Safer World"

"A Safer Family. A Safer World" is a **new prevention resource** aimed at parents and caregivers of children 0-12, and is also useful for providers working with children. The content is research-based and offers best practices of primary prevention, focusing specifically on proactive things people can do and say. It is written at a 6th grade reading level, and has now been translated into 10 languages.

The booklet is free online (**PDF download**), and printed copies can also be ordered. Currently, there are printed copies in English and Spanish as well as a customizable version with a blank space where local programs can adhere their own label on the last page.

PBS Documentary "Pervert Park"

Pervert Park begs the question of whether lifetime registries, monitoring, and restrictions on housing and work options are effective in protecting communities. How do we both protect public safety and implement just policies? What should we do with hundreds of thousands of people who have been convicted of sex offenses and completed their sentences? Are victims well-served by current public policies? Are we?

"Although many of their crimes are unspeakable, what do we as a community gain from our willful silence? Terminology Guidelines

To strengthen and make more consistent the language used to describe child sexual abuse and associated terminology, international and regional child rights and law enforcement agencies represented in an Interagency Working Group, launched an in depth analysis and discussion. Initiated through ECPAT International, the result is the "Terminology Guidelines for the Protection of Children from Sexual Exploitation and Sexual Abuse".

"In these important guidelines, policy makers, professional associations and child rights defenders find a crucial resource to provide precision in terminology, enhance accuracy in the development of monitoring tools, and gain conceptual clarity to mobilise efforts for the safeguard of children's freedom from sexual violence across regions," said Marta Santos Pais, the Special Representative to the UN Secretary General on Violence against Children.
